Training Courses

Public Safety Courses

- Senior Leadership Course on Tactical Emergency Casualty Care (TECC) and Fire, EMS, and Law Enforcement Integration – provided command and senior leadership with an overview on the development and uses of the TECC guidelines, application design into existing and new response protocols, curriculum design and implementation strategies.
- Fire/EMS TECC Provider Course Introduction into the concepts of TECC concentrating on the entire continuum of medical care in dynamic mass casualty, students gain knowledge and practical skills to implement TECC medical care into any high-risk Fire/EMS operation.
- Law Enforcement TECC Provider Course Concentrating on the first 5-10 minutes prior to the arrival of higher-level medical providers, provided law enforcement officers knowledge on the appropriate concepts of TECC, including a framework for officers to assess, identify, stabilize the immediately preventable life threats in mass casualty while accounting for the ongoing and dynamic tactical situation.
- Fire/EMS and Law Enforcement Integration Discussed common characteristics of active shooter events and provided the foundation for local development of active shooter coordinated interagency response. This course provided TECC training to both law enforcement and fire/EMS concluding with full speed practical scenarios with integration between the two disciplines.
- Unified Command Course Overview on the importance of unified command and the various priorities and considerations for incident commanders managing high threat events. Leaders were paired together across agencies and expected to manage various tabletop high threat scenarios. Class discussed new challenges, tactics and techniques facing responders when operating at high threat incidents, previous incidents and emergencies that presented unique circumstances for responders and their applicability to the jurisdiction.

- Warm Zone Care Models TECC overview and phases of care, warm zone operations and models, rescue task force assembling, bounding, threshold transitions, hallway movement, room entry, and casualty collection point operations, warm corridor, protected island, and law enforcement rescue.
- Active Violence with Fire for Tactical Environments Designed for law enforcement tactical officers operating in hostile conditions where fire or volatile atmospheres are present or these conditions are being used as a weapon, or deterrent against the officer.
- **Executive Protection Medical Course** Combination of didactic and small-scale based advanced medical training to provide immediate point-of-wounding stabilization for the principal, oneself, or an injured team member based on the foundational principles of TECC. Course includes mission planning and requirements, threat assessment elements, and tactical medicine.

Public Safety Drills & Exercises

- **Tabletop Exercise** Facilitated exercise designed for law enforcement and fire department incident commanders to operate in a Unified Command to effectively and efficiently manage an active violence response.
- No-Notice Exercises Multiple small-scale exercises conducted at various locations throughout the community to bring together an ad hoc group of firefighters and law enforcement officers who must team up and quickly work together to respond to a simulated active shooter/violence incident. Designed to challenge the patrol officers and firefighters that are expected to respond to these events.

Community/Civilian Courses

- Active Bystander: TECC Certification Training In an effort to address the "whole of community" preparedness, this course will provide medical education and training to civilian personnel for application in various emergency situations and environments. Provide an overview of the history, science, and evolution of TECC; types of injuries and applicable TECC interventions to improve survival (bleeding control, airway management, body positioning, recognition and simple management of chest and torso injury, shock and prevention of hypothermia, wound care, and patient movement.
- Advanced TECC Active Bystander Training Designed to build upon the information, skills, and curriculum presented in the initial course by providing students with opportunities to practice Active Bystander skills in real world scenarios. Course includes brief refresher on TECC and current guidelines, hands-on familiarity with TECC application and equipment, scenario-based practice.
- Active Bystander: TECC Train-the-Trainer Train students to develop the knowledge base and depth of understanding to take the model of TECC Active Bystander training and provide certification level training to members of their community to build a more resilient chain of survival.
- Active Shooter/Active Killing (AS/AVI) Training for School Administrators, Educators, or Business Owners – Scalable training program on AS/AVI taught through coordination with local police provided basic information on commonalities of AS/AVI, general knowledge on what to expect from both the police and fire/EMS operational response, and basic TECC for non-medical providers.

• Emergency Medicine Training – Prepares students to recognize, assess, and treat various medical emergencies utilizing and ragogical techniques geared to various learning styles and includes didactic presentations, psychomotor skill development, and scenario-based exercises with actual equipment and props.
